



# PURPOSE

North Cascades Institute’s Youth Leadership Adventures builds the next generation of conservation leaders by providing a suite of transformational learning experiences for youth who lack access to similar opportunities. The goal is to provide a gateway for youth to jumpstart their lifelong engagement with nature, stewardship and community and to provide an opportunity for personal, academic, and professional growth. The program uses a tiered tuition structure with scholarships available.





# ACCOMPLISHMENTS

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78 students contributed 2,688 service hours benefiting ecosystems in North Cascades National Park and Mt. Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest. Service work completed included the following:



**78** students contributed

**2,688** service hours

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**5** fire rings installed

**8** tent pads constructed or expanded

**600** sq feet of illegal tent pad space decommissioned

**650** feet of social trails decommissioned

**12** miles of trail brushed and maintained

**11** signs installed

**430** feet of new trail constructed

**3** pounds of invasive reed canarygrass removed

**15** pounds of invasive rush skeletonweed removed

**33** drainage ditches cleaned and maintained

**1** water bar and **1** check step constructed

**8** food storage boxes installed at Baker Lake
