#### Dear Educator,

Thank you for your interest in Mountain School, our award-winning environmental education program for elementary, middle and high school students. Established in 1990, it has become a national model for teaching young people about the natural world that surrounds them through intimate, direct learning experiences in the dramatic wilderness setting of the North Cascades.

Why take your students to the mountains to learn? A growing body of educational research shows that today's generation is more "plugged in" to electronics – but less tuned into the natural world – than any generation in history. As opportunities for direct experiences in nature have dwindled, the rate of clinical depression, obesity and learning disabilities has skyrocketed.

High quality interdisciplinary environmental education that includes direct experiences in the natural world has been shown to improve standardized test scores, grade point averages and decision-making skills. In fact, more than 90 percent of teachers who participate in Mountain School report their students showed improved problem solving and critical thinking skills. As one teacher remarked, "Today's children are experience-poor. Mountain School helps fill a void in their lives. They never forget it."





Mountain School is a nationally recognized environmental education program offered by North Cascades Institute in cooperation with North Cascades National Park. Mountain School students come to the North Cascades with their school class, teacher and chaperones to learn about the ecosystems, geology and natural and cultural history of the mountains. Mountain School gives young people an experience they will remember forever – a chance to increase their knowledge of the world with their bodies, minds and spirits.

### MOUNTAIN SCHOOL AT NORTH CASCADES ENVIRONMENTAL LEARNING CENTER

Our Learning Center is located in North Cascades National Park in the heart of the North Cascades mountain range. Our facility includes classrooms, labs, a library, dining hall and lodges, all nestled on the shores of Diablo Lake along with numerous trails and three trailside learning shelters. Mountain School participants stay in three dormitorystyle lodges, which sleep a total of 69 participants. Each room sleeps three participants with two shared, gender-specific bathrooms in each lodge. Our Foodshed Program offers appealing and wholesome food choices that are local, organic and sustainably produced. We challenge each class to minimize its food waste through composting. Weather at the Learning Center varies greatly depending on the season and we ask participants to be prepared for all conditions. Safety is of the highest priority, whether we're out on the trails or in the lodges. Travel time to the Learning Center from Bellingham is approximately two hours; three hours from Seattle. There are three Learning Center programs available as a three or five day option:

4TH - 8TH GRADE

#### **ECOSYSTEM EXPLORATIONS**

A strong focus on science and the natural and cultural history of the North Cascades provides the academic foundation of this keystone Mountain School program. Days are spent exploring the trails that surround the Learning Center, from Deer Creek, lined with sword ferns, to the Sourdough Waterfall where students have views of glacially-carved valleys. Hands-on inquiry-based lessons along the way introduce students to mountain ecosystems and ecological concepts and provide students an up-close look at the diverse ecological communities in the North Cascades. The educational experience continues back at the Learning Center campus in our fully equipped Aquatic and Terrestrial labs. Topics of study may include animals of the North Cascades, biodiversity, aquatic ecology, glaciers and geology, cultural history, ethnobotany and forest ecology.

7TH - 12TH GRADE

#### FIELD SCIENCE AND LEADERSHIP: CARNIVORES

Students are introduced to field science and research skills by investigating the habitat potential of the forest community surrounding the Learning Center for carnivores such as the fisher and wolverine, endangered forest dwellers. Participants are taught how to measure tree diversity, canopy cover, coarse woody debris and ground cover by creating and surveying their own forest transects in small groups. Students learn the roles of forest carnivores in the ecosystem and the history of hunting and trapping that have dramatically reduced their numbers. At the end of this program, groups analyze their data and draw conclusions regarding the potential of the Learning Center forests for regional wildlife.

9TH - 12TH GRADE

#### FIELD SCIENCE AND LEADERSHIP: WATER QUALITY

Students investigate the health of the Deer Creek watershed, a lush, perennial creek bordering the Learning Center campus. Students are introduced to field science and research skills by examining the physical, chemical and biological components of the watershed through site observations, water quality testing and examination of benthic macroinvertebrates. Students learn how these techniques are used by park researchers to assess the vitality of watersheds draining into the Skagit River and come to their own conclusions about the sustainability of this valuable resource.



#### **OUR CLASSROOM**

Mountain School is surrounded by 7,000,000 acres of protected public lands in Washington and British Columbia. In the middle lies 684,000-acre North Cascades National Park – our neighborhood. With 93 percent of its area designated as wilderness, it is known for its steep mountains, ever-flowing streams and tremendous biological diversity. With more than 300 glaciers and countless snowfields, the park is one of the most rugged and heavily glaciated areas in the United States outside of Alaska. The North Cascades are a national treasure and a living laboratory awaiting discovery.

#### **OUR INSTRUCTORS**

Students break up into small hiking and learning groups with approximately a one-to-five adult/student ratio. Teachers and chaperones are an integral part of Mountain School, participating fully in all activities. North Cascades Institute education staff design lessons and provide leadership at Mountain School. Instructors are a combination of environmental educators, graduate students studying environmental education and National Park Service rangers. All instructors have CPR and first aid certification. In addition, many have Wilderness First Responder (WFR) training, an advanced 80-hour first aid certification.

#### **OUR CURRICULUM**

While at Mountain School, students spend the majority of their time outside, hiking on trails and exploring mountain ecosystems first-hand through interdisciplinary activities. Experiential, hands-on activities in science, math, language, music, art, social studies and conservation fill days to the brim. Program activities extend through the evening. Mountain School curriculum is aligned with the Washington Assessment of Student Learning (WASL), Grade Level Expectations (GLEs) and Essential Academic Learning Requirements (EALRs) and designed to enhance classroom learning. With pre-trip and post-trip lessons included in the teacher's guide, teachers have ready-to-go, useful tools to help prepare their students for Mountain School and make connections in the classroom following their field experience.

#### PRICING AND SCHOLARSHIPS

#### MORE INFORMATION

Mountain School serves a variety of schools and the majority of participating classes are given generous scholarship support to attend Mountain School. With no scholarship support, the full cost of the program is \$300 per participant for a three-day program and \$550 for a five-day program. The classroom teacher of a group of 20 or more students attends at no charge; additional adults pay the same rate as the students. Scholarships must be requested through the application process.

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#### HOW TO SCHEDULE A MOUNTAIN SCHOOL PROGRAM

- 1. Fill out the enclosed application and return it to the address at left. Please call or email if you have questions or need more information. You may also go directly to our website at www.ncascades.org/school.
- 2. Once your application has been received, a Mountain School representative will call and schedule dates for your group. Programming is available from mid-March to mid-June and from mid-September to mid-November. Programs for the spring should be scheduled by December 15 of the previous year and programs for fall should be scheduled by May 15 of the current year.
- **3.** You will be sent a contract to complete. Please make sure that all information is correct, sign and return the contract and a deposit of 10% within two weeks. The deposit will be deducted from your final bill. Billing occurs after the program is completed. Your reservation will be considered final after paperwork and deposit are received.
- **4.** After we receive the signed contract and deposit, you will be sent a packet containing all the materials that you will need to plan a rewarding trip to the North Cascades for your class.


