at the Gordon Carter Environmental Education Site

Bellingham Public Schools is thrilled to tell you about our new field trip for all third graders:

Forest School is an environmental education program provided in partnership between the North Cascades Institute and Bellingham Public Schools. Students will spend their time at the Gordon Carter Environmental Education site for a day of learning in the outdoors, a day that integrates natural history, science, and social studies. Students, chaperones and teachers will be transported to and from Forest School in a school district bus within the normal school day schedule.

- Can you attend as a chaperone? If so, contact your child's teacher. Chaperones will travel with the class, and will participate in trail activities and assist with supervision of students.

What will your child be learning?

The central guiding idea of Forest School is: *Organisms and environments are interdependent*. Under the guidance of environmental educators who specialize in teaching young people, students will explore how plants, animals and people interact within an environment to meet their needs. They will also explore how changes to plants, animals, people and/or the environment can affect one another. They also get a positive outdoor educational experience that helps develop social and personal skills and experience academic and physical challenges in a welcoming setting.

What can you ask your child about?

This field trip will prompt a great dinner-table conversation! You might ask:

- What animal group were you a part of? What did you learn about your animal?
- You might have played bingo or done a scavenger hunt. What did you learn about what animals need to survive?
- How did you see organisms interacting in the forest?
- What is something you learned about how people and the environment affect each other?

What about bad weather?

Spring and fall weather can be very unpredictable. While we always hope for sunny and warm days, it is important to be prepared for cold, wet, and windy weather too. Rain or shine, we will attend Forest School!

What is the Gordon Carter Environmental Education Site?

This site, on the southeast end of Lake Whatcom, is also known as the conservation site. It has been the home of outdoor education for many grade levels in Bellingham Public Schools since 1973. Long-time residents may remember a pioneer field trip where students got to engage in some of the day-to-day activities of a settler in 1886.

Thanks to the generosity of our community in our recent bond, we look forward to improvements to the site to allow it to continue to serve our students' learning for decades to come.

What is the North Cascades Institute?

North Cascades Institute is a long-time education partner with Bellingham Public Schools. Since 1990, they have hosted Mountain School, a multi-day residential education program at North Cascades Environmental Learning Center that all our fifth graders attend.
