Dear Friend,

In March I attended final capstone presentations and graduation of our 15th cohort of graduate students. After a week of listening, learning and late night conversations, I felt inspired and invigorated by these amazing students. Their commitment to each other, to their own students, and to the planet makes me proud. They step into the world ready to make a difference—with their Master of Education degree from Western Washington University in one hand and a shared mission for social justice firmly grasped in the other.

Emma Ewert's capstone, *Holding the Center: Story and Community,* wove together her family's history with her own search for self, and shared how stories—whether spoken, written, acted or sung—are what make us human. She traced her own story arc from Lopez Island to the summits of the North Cascades.

Emma was introduced to North Cascades Institute 17 years ago when she attended Mountain School as a fifth-grader with her father, a teacher at Lopez



Elementary School. Those were the days when Mountain School took place in "Big Green," the Army tent that served as a kitchen and rainy day classroom at the Newhalem campground. Emma remembers the rain, learning the names of Cascadia's native trees, and how enthusiastic the instructors were.

"But mostly, **I remember my feeling of being deeply connected with nature and how inspired I was**," says Emma. "Those formative experiences influenced my decision to pursue environmental education as a career and to attend North Cascades Institute's graduate program."

"**Kids have to learn where they come from**," she told me. "If we understand what we have *here*, in this place, we know that we have to take care of it. Making decisions about environmental sustainability makes sense once you've *fallen in love with the place*."

Emma's story reminds me that now—more than ever—we need to help young people fall in love with their public lands and their local ecosystems, so that they will care for and protect these special places we call home. "I was drawn to the Institute's **M.Ed. graduate program** because it's all about experiential, handson learning. You're immediately *doing* something with what you're learning. North Cascades Institute fosters this vibrant and continual learning environment, which keeps teaching fresh and exciting."

"I was nervous when I started teaching **Mountain School**, but I remembered the feelings and connection to nature that it fostered in me, which eased my fears. I wanted

to help kids walk away jazzed, and feel so good about this place that they want to return. If I'm doing my job, the right things just happen."



"In working with **Youth Leadership Adventures** over the summer, I got to mentor three apprentices and watch these young women of color grow as educators. And I witnessed the power of students sharing their stories and being vulnerable. The appreciation and support they showed one another, despite coming from different backgrounds was powerful. The greatest gift we can give someone is to really hear their story."

outdoors and sharing it with others—that I am the happiest. So why not make this a job? Plus, doing this work keeps me connected to my father. Getting to pass forward a love for the outdoors to other kids continues his legacy."
